The monument marking the Shipyard Site, is a large boulder taken from a field. Recessed on the front elevation is a bronze plaque. At the top appears a clipper ship typical of vessels built from 1782-1861.

There is a short historical summary inscribed below, followed by a listing of doners of the site.

Under the direction of the Historic Commission the plaque was completed in 1979.

The discovery of oil which had a tragic impact on the whaling industry, plus the Panic of 1857, caught Mason Barney with a sizeable portion of his fortune tied up in two large ships still on the stocks and unsold. By the time he disposed of his vessels, his fortune was depleated and everything was absorbed by his creditors.

Mason Barney often called magistrate extraordinary, not only built ships but ran the post office, a brickyard, a local grocery store with rum on tap, owned a cluster of dwellings, plus other branches of business. He died in 1868. His respectful workers and loving friends called him "squire Barney".
