ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE Describe important architectural features and evaluate in terms of other buildings within the community.

This colonial revival, shingle cottage has a 2-story gambrel roof. The inset southern porch and the enclosed side porch, utilize the homes picturesque setting. There is a mid-gable with 2 shed dormers on the west side and all the windows are 2 over 1.

HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE Explain the role owners played in local or state history and how the building relates to the development of the community.

The significance lies in the section of Gardners Neck in which this house is located. It was one of the first areas in town to be inhabited by natives and colonists alike and in the early 20th century became the area of Swansea for substantial summer cottages and year-round nomes.
